

**A RESOLUTION HONORING RETIRED LT. COL. DANIEL D. JONES BY
DEDICATING THE OLD HEADY ROAD BRIDGE OVER INTERSTATE
265 AS “DANIEL JONES MEMORIAL BRIDGE.”**

SPONSORED BY: COUNCIL MEMBER STUART BENSON

WHEREAS, Retired Lt. Col. Daniel Dale Jones was born on February 28, 1974, in Louisville, Kentucky;

WHEREAS, Retired Lt. Col. Jones lived on Old Heady Road near the bridge over Interstate 265 when he was growing up, and he attended Jeffersontown High School;

WHEREAS, Retired Lt. Col. Jones served in the United States Army in the 82nd Airborne Division and the 101st Airborne Division, and he served two tours of duty in Iraq (Operation Iraqi Freedom 1 and 3);

WHEREAS, Retired Lt. Col. Jones was awarded over twelve service medals, including the prestigious Legion of Merit, given for exceptionally meritorious conduct in the performance of outstanding service and achievement;

WHEREAS, Retired Lt. Col. Jones was a wonderful father, mentor and friend; and

WHEREAS, Retired Lt. Col. Jones was killed in a small-engine plane accident on June 26, 2023.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL OF THE LOUISVILLE/ JEFFERSON COUNTY METRO (“METRO COUNCIL”) AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION I: Retired Lt. Col. Daniel Dale Jones be honored by designating the Old Heady Road bridge over Interstate 265 in Jefferson County as “Daniel Jones Memorial Bridge.”

SECTION II: The Office of Public Works is hereby directed to move forward with all necessary fabrication and installation of two honorary street signs upon the passage of this Resolution and the receipt of funds to cover the expense.

SECTION III: This Resolution shall take effect upon its passage and approval.





Good morning.

When I read the email chain, it looks like this is the recommended procedure:

My guess would be that the legislator discusses with the local entity about naming the bridge and if they are in agreement, include it in the omnibus bill. Once it's passed and we notify the Districts of the roads and bridges that need to be named in their respective Districts, that particular District would then need to work with that city/county government regarding installing signs on their right-of-way (may need an Agreement for Services). If the legislator has discussed with the city/county, they should be aware of it when the bill is passed.

So, I believe that it should be included in the omnibus bill, and once, that is done, we can work with the local KYTC district to get this accomplished. Metro Council can also pass a resolution as to the naming and the installation of the signs. Does that sound right to you?

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Below is the message I received from Kenny Bishop, KYTC Legislative Liaison. They say we can put it in the omnibus Resolution, but then they will have to come back to Louisville Metro and get their permission to install the signs.

Mr. Chairman, we have always drawn a pretty bright line about NOT naming anything that is not on a state or federal highway. I will go with whatever you wish to do.

Angela, I think it is pretty clear that the KYTC considers this bridge to be Louisville Metro right of way.

Kenny is copied on this email if anyone needs .

Please let me know how you all wish to proceed.

From our guy who manages the honorary signs program:

According to our database, there are 6 named bridges on county roads, but none of them were done legislatively, so I am not sure how they would proceed. All but one was done before my time. The one that I am aware of and somewhat involved in was in Perry County...the state built a bridge for Perry County on a county road and named it outside of the legislature.

My guess would be that the legislator discusses with the local entity about naming the bridge and if they are in agreement, include it in the omnibus bill. Once it's passed and we notify the Districts of the roads and bridges that need to be named in their respective Districts, that particular District would then need to work with that city/county government regarding installing signs on their right-of-way (may need an Agreement for Services). If the legislator has discussed with the city/county, they should be aware of it when the bill is passed

Mr. Daniel Jones displayed exceptional and meritorious service for nearly 6 years to the Officer Personnel Management Directorate, the US Army Human Resources Command and the United States Army where he ultimately served as the Branch Chief, Advanced Education Program Branch, Leader Development Division. His years of steadfast leadership, subject matter expertise and impactful service has left an indelible mark on the organization and will continue to positively shape policies, drive best practices and inform Army Senior Leader of the future of Officer Education in years to come.

Daniel's leadership first as the ACS Section Team Chief and then as the Branch Chief for the Advanced Education Programs Branch (AEPB) has contributed immeasurably to the United States Army Officer Corps intellectual development through the excellent program management. As a trusted advisor to the CG, HRC, the Director of OPMD and the Division Chief for Leader Development Division on all matters of Advanced Civilian Education and Broadening Opportunities, Daniel often spearheaded creating new programs for the Army. As the Army's subject matter experience on advanced education, Daniel was often consulted by the Talent Management Task Force regarding Officer Education initiatives – taking time to introduce governing regulations, directives, fiscal constraints and personnel (readiness) limitations. Dan's valued advice was able to shape initiatives that created the desired end state. Dan was a key member of an Operational Planning Team (OPT) to execute the Secretary of the Army's Directive to invest in Artificial Intelligence education IOT to ensure the Army's dominance in future warfare. Dan partnered with the Artificial Intelligence Task Force to create a new broadening opportunity and create educational program offered and funded by the Army at Carnegie Mellon University for masters degree in Data Engineering or Data Science. This program will continue in the future and is part of the legacy that Dan's leadership and expertise will continue to shape officer education in the future.

While often required to coordinate with other Department of the Army Headquarters and major commands to provide information and guidance on all actions and initiatives affecting officer education, Dan was solely responsible the planning, programming, budgeting and funds execution in excess of \$40 million annually and about \$250 million across the POM years. Dan each year successfully submitted and defended the program requirement to the Training Program Execution Group (TPEG). He refined the internal process to better track obligations, which enabled him to be able to project funding needs to support timely program decisions. During the Secretary of the Army and Chief of Staff, Army "night court" budget cutting session, Dan was able to provide up to date and accurate information to the Army G-3 which resulted in only minor cuts to the officer education budget.

Dan coordinated with the assignment branches and proponents to allocate the program dollars received through a successful POM submission through Advanced Civil Schooling allocations each fiscal year. The allocations were based on Army requirements and priorities that necessitated advanced education in order to fulfill the requirements of the position. Dan expertly ensured that each branch and proponents received their fair share of the program dollars but also took into consideration the Army's priorities. Dan and his team obligated tuition for each officer in an advanced education program, by semester, by university. The Army has anywhere between 1500-1800 officer is advance education programs annually and timely tuition payments reflect positively upon HRC and the Army.

The Broadening Opportunities Portfolio was also managed by Daniel Jones. Many of these programs are highly visible, well known programs among Army Senior Leaders and include such notable programs as the Joint Chiefs of Staff Intern Program, Office of Congressional Liaison Fellowship and the Olmsted Scholarship program. Dan oversaw the execution of these programs excellently. He created outstanding working relationships with the program proponents and always work tirelessly to ensure the programs remained funded, well advertised through the BOP catalog and had top tier officers participating in them.

In conclusion, the totality of Daniel Jones's significant and impactful contribution to the Officer Personnel Management Directorate and the education of Officers cannot be overstated. His exceptional performance, selfless military career and civilian service from February 2019 to June 2023 reflect great upon him, the Leader Development Division, Officer Personnel Management Directorate, the Army Human Resources Command and the United States Army.

I would like to lend my support to the Jones' family effort to name a Jefferson Conty Bridge on Old Heddy Road after the late Daniel D. Jones. Dan died tragically in June due to a small plane crash, and his life was cut short; however, his legacy and character live on still inspiring others to be kinder, more empathetic and be forgiving - just as Daniel's Lord and Savior Jesus Christ taught us. Daniel was a "son of Louisville", a local boy who did well and is deserving of this honor.

I had the pleasure of being Dan's boss at the US Army Human Resources Command. When Dan was retiring from the Army (his last assignment in "uniform" was as a LTC in the US Army Human Resources Command), I specifically sought out to hire Dan to work for me as a civil servant and military human resources specialist. His reputation was stellar - built upon his integrity, strong work ethic and his strong character. Dan was responsible for managing 10 people and a budget of roughly \$40 million annually ensuring all the Army officers in advanced civilian education (master's and PhD programs) tuition was paid in a timely manner. He had to keep exacting records of expenditures of the budget due to the requirement of standing audit ready. Dan also often had to coordinate with colleagues in the Pentagon, coordinating for the budget and obtaining additional guidance. The earmark of all his duties and performance was his professionalism and affable personality. Everyone I knew who had a professional interaction with Dan always relayed to me that he was such a nice guy. Working in the Army and for the Army as civilian, as you can imagine we have to deal with contentious issues. But because of Dan's personality, character, and professionalism, he had a great calming effect on those around him. The employees under his leadership enjoyed him as their boss. Daniel knew how to motivate them individually to get them each to perform their duties to the best of their abilities. He knew when to push them and when to ease off. His branch under his leadership enjoyed very high morale and genuinely care of each other and work as a close-knit team still.

Daniel was awarded the Meritorious Civilian Service Medal posthumously. I attached as a reference to outline the impact Dan had on the Army. It is hard to put into words to explain the impact of the loss of Daniel Jones.
