They stopped and found the person not breathing and without a pulse Jenna and Sylvia, who is a retired firefighter, jumped into action. Sylvia immediately started CPR and administered provided by Eric Anderson a citizen by standard.

Sarah and crystal borrows of bright view, health and outpatient drug and alcohol addiction treatment center also joined the group with additional doses of.

The group work to save the young man's life with 10 continuous minutes of CPR and the administration of 6 doses of finally, the man began breathing again and regain consciousness before EMS arrived and transported him to the hospital.

It is because of the heroic actions of our 2 metro public works employees. Sylvia Gardner and gentlemen. Kenny.

With these 3 good Samaritans, Sarah Carson, crystal and Eric Anderson that a young man's life was saved.

He now is the 2nd chance, thanks to each of you and your actions, your active compassion and willingness to intervene to save a fellow citizen speaks volumes about your integrity and we on the council Thank you for being role models in our city.

Tonight we honor and thank you for your bravery and the action to preserve a stranger's life. Your actions saved his family and friends from a devastating loss.

We did not simply shut down due to financial mismanagement.

What I got was a phone call from David James telling me I needed to put my energy somewhere else. I believe resource retaliation. Corruption is real.

My father was a full time employee of the John Berks society. 1 of their programs was support your local police in the 9,960 s police brutality. Corruption were so bad large cities were starting civilian oversight. The virtuous Heidi was part of a faction that said this would ruin policing.

Please had to control all aspects of police policy conduct. aspects of police policy conduct

And culture citizens had no idea what it was to be a police officer. I watched the budget committee meeting, expecting. Maybe a mental health expert explained the needs for a wellness center that address what the DJ report identified.

Instead, the presentation was from within the closed loop of police culture, they had to control all aspects please policy.

Culture citizens had no idea what it was like to be a police officer. Same argument is 9,960 in hands and a DJ told us.

Move on victims, you need to heal victims as leadership. We don't want or need.

Hi, my name is Joanie Prentice and I'm a constituent of councilman Ben Reno Weber in district 8. I'm also a member of global standing up for racial dresses.

Grandma and a retired hospice nurse, I want to start with voicing my strong opposition to spending 400 Million dollars or so on a bigger shiny or new jail in this budget reviewing season of metro government.

I want to focus on the money. Our taxpayer money. taxpayer money

A new jail puts the taxpayers money in the wrong place.

As I've taken a deeper dive into this complicated issue.

I've come to believe a new big jail really isn't necessary and will not solve the problems. You might think it may solve.

Intriguing tidbits of information, and I acknowledge upfront incarceration how to change his daily. 15% of the people currently held at our jail are actually people convicted of a state felony, and should be at state prisons.

prisons

It's my understanding, the state only pays Louisville, 38 dollars a day, but it costs tax payers 146 dollars a day.

To hold them here, a new bigger jail will only give the state more room to send more state prisoners to loyal and local tax payers, get to pick up the tab for the state.

For state prisoners, it costs little taxpayers around 21,000 dollars a day.

7.9 Million dollars a year.

I can think of better ways to spend our money. How about you?

Local taxpayers have been screaming.

For programs and services that focus on root causes of violence and crime not a pretty new building. That is just window dressing.

What if metro council commissioned and investigation into treatment and more diversion options?

The buyer report is what many of us consider to be a crime scene investigation.

We need to see a treatment investigation to let us take good care of the over 17,000 people who get admitted to metro corrections annually.

It could look at how the community corrections center on Wes chestnut could be used. It's been closed for several years for lack of staffing.

It's close to hospitals and could be used for detox.

And persons with mental health issues, there are so many ways to reduce the number of people incarcerated. Let's be creative.

Let's be bold. Let's look at solvable. Root causes.

Let's find eviction assistance and affordable housing.

Let's take an honest look at what Red lining did to generational wealth west of 9th.

And let's take an honest, look at over policing of our black brothers and sisters, as outlined in the report.

Let's do something about bail and how it keeps poor people locked up.

Let's have a community center in every district.

And improve funding to community community ministries.

Let's look at how we can approve job satisfaction and effectiveness for corrections officers to improve staffing shortages.

Let's look at how we prepare incarcerated people for release back into society.

And let's look at how other communities might be doing it with success.

Let's be just in our deliberations about spending tax payer money.

A, pretty shiny new building won't solve any of these types of community focused issues.

I'd say, no to a new jail. Thank you. Thank you Becky.

Right.

Becky keys.

Hello, I'm Becky keys. Um, I'm in district 17 council president Winkler district. Um, I'm also a court watch volunteer with L search.

Meaning I observe along with others arraignment where judges decide what happens to those that get arrested, whether they're released what bail amounts are said.

If they'll put it on home across duration, et cetera by the way I won't go into cash bail but just to say that you have folks.

Who have money and who don't for the same offense? Those who have money get out.

Those who do not stay in.

And they have not been convicted yet, and they stay for long periods of time.

Others who've spoken here have already covered that, but I'm also a member of the D. C. stakeholders group that means quarterly with director Collins.

I've toured the jail as part of that group.

I say all of that to say that we all want the best outcomes for our community. We all want to help those needing treatment for substance abuse trauma, mental health.

Helplessness all these issues are at the root cause of why so many end up in jail.

In the 1st place, not all but many so to have the best outcome result.

We need to intercept them before they reach our criminal justice system. Once they're in. It's hard to get out.

The fingers of the justice system seems to not want to let go.

In addition to getting out.

There's a lot of obstacles to re, entry some almost insurmountable.

Why not reach them before they get there so they don't have a record so they don't have issues getting a job. So they don't aren't separated from their families. When you have someone that needs treatment, they need to be in a safe space to get that.

And jail is not it.

I think it's easy to fall for the false idea that building a new building somehow fixes everything. I think, as Americans, we like.

To think of spaces being fixed by getting new things, put in them but this issue is way more serious and more complicated.

Several of you mentioned the need for healing the other week.

And I think I would ask what, what does healing look like in action.

Is it billing us of jail to incarcerate more?

Or is it to be doing something different to helping people where they are to getting them healthier? So that we're safer.

Save money, probably in the long run and do the right thing.

Let's spend that money on our community before it gets to that point where they're in our jail.

Or may have supports deflection. Our GL, director supports diversion. Our judges are frustrated.

I've seen them we've seen them frustrated in court because they have the same folks coming through with low level offenses, or for failed failures to appear there. Everyone seems to be in agreement that something needs to be done differently.

So, I say, let's do that. Thank you.

As an organization we applaud the mayor for, including 15Million for the trfs fund 50Million dollars for the trust fund in his budget proposal to you an increase since the trust fund ordinance calls for 10Million.

However, that ordinance was written in 2008. written in two thousand and eight

A proposal of 15Million dollars is in 2023 is probably not even level funded. Once you take all the inflation adjusted expenses into account.

Meanwhile, the needs have not decreased. There are 72,000 families in global, paying unaffordable housing costs.

Quality affordable housing is not only 1 of the most foundational needs for the health of a family, but also for the health of the city.

Ensuring stable housing increases the likelihood of children's success in school.

Optimizes adult's ability to do well at work.

And improves the health and wellbeing of aging.

Instead, what we are seeing after the lifting of the covid eviction moratorium is a flood of eviction filings.

There is little affordable housing for those evicted families and individuals to go to.

During the pandemic more than 125Million in American rescue plan, rent and utility assistance was distributed by local, keeping families in their homes and with the power on.

Today with that plan, expired, rental housing advocates are calling on elected officials to dedicate at least 16Million dollars toward rent assistance and other programs.

A, doubling of the mayor's proposal.

The housing problem in the community can only be addressed when there are enough places for all people to live.

Right now there just isn't removal desperately needs more permanent, supportive housing, very low income housing and low income housing.

Metro Council, we encourage you to do the right thing for all housing needs.

Fund rental assistance to keep people safe from addiction.

And put at least 15 Million dollars into the trust fund. So more quality affordable housing will be built in the years to come.

That investment will pay a qualitative and quantitative return for the city for generations to come.

Healthier happier and more productive citizens.

I have sent you an overview of serious incidents at the libraries and a list of the union's ideas for how we can make our library safe.

I raised the issue and gave substantially the same ideas to Nicole. George, who graciously met me this past Monday.

Library workers have in recent months, and the victims of threats, mistreatment by superiors vehicle, vandalism, stalking, physical assault and tense situations involving fights and brandishing of knives and guns.

These incidents traumatize library workers.

Lower staff, morale and lead good workers to leave the library.

Pay and staffing levels are critically low, especially in light of the training education and expertise required to work in the library and the personal risk taken by library workers.

The risk reward calculation has proven too much for many of my Co workers to remain.

Feelings of public goodwill and the joy of helping the public can only go so far and are not substitutes for fair compensation and safety at work.

We are not asking for extraordinary measures or high security facilities. Many incidents could have been prevented with better security and more resources properly applied when these issues are raised by workers in the union with library administration years ago, rather than dismissed.

Normal deserves a library administration willing and able to advocate for the library staff and support our libraries and take work or feedback. Seriously, especially in safety critical matters. Metro council members.

We bring this to your attention so that you can work with the mayor's office and help insure. Our libraries are safer workers and members of.

Public as we approach the final vote on the budget, we deserve investment in our community, including the library system. We all deserve safe libraries.
